PRAYER REQUESTS

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June Tewes Memorial Mission Trip to Haiti January 15-20, 2014

Fourteen of us from Messiah and two from North Carolina boarded planes on Wednesday, January 15 and sent some personal version of this prayer heavenward: "Lord, June had an amazing servant heart. Let us honor her vision. Use us as your instruments to bless the people of Haiti."

Our group included seasoned mission workers as well as novices, and we focused on several goals: 1) Distribute "pillowcase dresses" and shorts, along with socks, underwear, and health kits. June was part of a Messiah ladies group that has sewed dresses and shorts over the last few years. 2) Conduct a medical clinic. 3) Paint the church/school library at Pastor Thomas' church (Delmas 75), and prepare for a planned construction project. 4) Share the gospel message with children through a faith bracelet craft and coloring books/crayons.

Before we set to work, we attempted to absorb some of the culture. Long-time Haiti shepherd Dick Buethe had engaged his usual driver and mini-bus for the duration of our trip. Our first destination was a mountain lookout with a beautiful view of the city and bay of Port-au-Prince. We all came to appreciate Leonard's skillful and assertive driving on uneven roads in a city of 3.5 million people and no stoplights. Since Haitians speak French or French Creole, we also valued our translator Josue, a policeman on holiday.

We noted that many buildings were in disrepair, with piles of rubble and refuse everywhere. Most property was behind gated walls topped with razor wire or broken bottles to repel intruders. The smells of diesel fumes, raw sewage, and acrid smoke from trash fires filled the air. People were walking everywhere along the roads, even sandwiched between lanes and vehicles in stop-and-go traffic. Tap-taps, pickups converted to mini-buses, were a common site. People who were not walking lined the roads with stalls to sell their wares.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ Jesus,

Greetings to each one of you in the name of our only Lord and Savior!

I am more than excited to report that our Lord's work in Haiti goes on with many blessings. I would like to share a few of those blessings with you in this article.



First of all, we are pleased to report that a

library for the school at Good Shepherd (Pastor Thomas Bernard's congregation) has been completed and was dedicated on February 9, 2014. This was important because the Haitian government demands that a school, in order to be certified, needs a library with books suitable and adequate for the students in attendance. The completion of the library meets this requirement.

Another blessing is the fact that the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Haiti has approved for membership the congregation currently served by Pastor Maurice Pierre. A ceremony celebrating this fact was held on March 9, 2014. We are pleased to report that our Executive Director, Mr. Dick Buethe, was in attendance that day, along with some of his family members. The Buethe family has been intimately involved with Lutheran work in Haiti from the very beginning, so it is only fitting that he and his family should be there on this momentous occasion. Please keep this new church in your prayers.

Work has also been progressing on the addition of a new classroom at Good Shepherd that will house another high school class. The Haitian educational system includes an additional year of high school, grade 13, that we do not have in the U.S. Until now students at Good Shepherd needed to transfer to another school for their final year of schooling. The addition of the classroom will enable students to complete their high school education at Good Shepherd, and then advance to the University for a College Degree. We thank God for all who have so tirelessly worked on this effort.

Work has continued on the new church in Leogane. Workers from the U.S. were there in February plastering walls and doing other work to hasten the completion of this facility. We are all anxious to see this work finished. Once again we thank all those who have given of their time, energy and finances to make this happen. (continued on page 5)

There were many sellers, but few buyers. Every time the bus paused, locals were persistent in their efforts to sell their handcrafted arts. Especially along the mountain road we saw groups of school children in uniforms specific to their private schools. Clothing was spotless and girls adorned their braided hair with ribbons and barrettes. However, we learned that even though education is highly valued, most children can't afford to attend school.



During our time in Port-au-Prince we were pleased to visit

Leonard's church twice—once for an evening prayer service and once for a Gospel concert in our honor. This wonderful church, pastored by Maurice Pierre, gathers in Leonard's covered carport and may be similar to early Messiah. Chairs are carried in. Talented musicians lead familiar praise music (in French) using modern sound equipment and instruments. On a later day, it was here that we distributed clothing and health kits to people with eager, clutching hands. Dick will be present in March when the church is received into the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Haiti.

With a Haitian doctor, Pastor John's brother Joel (a PA), and several of us in the medical field, we conducted a clinic housed in a metal shipping container at Pastor Thomas' church. About 185 patients were assessed and treated over the course of three days. There were a few heartrending cases. Access to medical care is quite limited, and the people were gracious and appreciative.

The library overlooking the sanctuary at Delmas 75 was painted with white vinyl paint, which was the consistency of Elmer's Glue. Further planning and assessment was done for an addition to the building. School classrooms were visited and children enjoyed making and receiving faith bracelets, along with coloring books and crayons. This became a springboard for assessing educational needs and challenges, providing information for future projects.

Our last full day in Haiti was a highlight. We joined people dressed in their very best to worship at Pastor Thomas' beautiful church for 3 hours, and that time just flew by. Much of the service was praise music by animated adult and children's choirs, and congregants singing from their hearts. Suddenly, Denise heard her name announced, and she graciously rose and shared a beautiful number. With Pastor Thomas translating, Pastor John preached a stirring sermon acknowledging our different cultures but focusing on our

commonalities as fellow Christians. Pastor John also introduced our team, with moving words about June's role. We even received Communion. It is an amazing feeling to share worship in a

different culture and language and recognize tangibly that we are worshiping the same God.

A Day In The Life Of A Mission Team In Haiti Feb. 10, 2014

Monday thoughts from everyone:

We started with Isaiah 6:9 about going out and remembering to share God's Love and Word!

Today was labeled Crossfit day!! Everyone was used today. Some were used outside the gate of the school filling 5 gallon buckets with sand or rock. The buckets were then handed off to someone with a wheelbarrow (who could transport 3 buckets) or



someone walked with one bucket to the staircase where it was handed off to someone who wanted to get a good leg workout in going up a flight of stairs. The bucket then proceeded through a chain of hands until the second staircase where it was transported again and went up to the third floor. It was then picked up by another team member to be emptied in a pile to make mortar. This bucket was then thrown from the third floor down to a waiting team member and repeated over and over again. We did this for a few hours until we took a lunch break. Keith joined some jump roping during recess with some girls- impressive.

We then passed out rice, goodies and a tip to the Haitian workers that worked so hard during our time there and we prayed with them (with Leonard translating). We had lunch and then moved on to Lophane's for an afternoon of more hard labor. Cinder block here we come.

Daryl fixed a bucket with work gloves and duct tape! It held the water in, somewhat. We definitely hit a wall today. It was a great day but exhausting. When we returned home we packed the bus with 26 bags of rice that will be delivered at 6:30 am in the morning.



Our final visit on Sunday was to an orphanage run by a woman named Josie, who has a beautiful spirit and a heart for children. Twenty-one children were waving and eagerly anticipating our arrival. Like all of the children we worked with, we found these children to be enchanting. They were lovable and eager to be held, always melting into our arms and laps. The men roughhoused with the kids, hoisting them up on shoulders and eliciting excited giggles. We had provided 20-some large bags of rice and beans the day before and now brought socks, underwear, and health kits along with a cash gift. We toured the spotless building with gleaming tiles and spartan furnishings, eager to plan new ways to help.



On our final evening, a simple prayer was offered that spoke for all of us. "Lord, we don't know why you picked us to live where we do, but we are grateful for your many blessings..." God is visible in Haiti—in the work of devoted pastors, in the many missionary teams, in the



Jesus Loves Me slogans on tap-taps, in the happiness of the people despite their lack of material means. Our trip was rewarding and fulfilling. We all left a part of our hearts in Haiti, joining the hearts of those who have gone before us, and those who will follow. As is commonly the case, for whatever blessing we offered, we felt blessed with a greater measure in return.

HAITI TRIP January 2014 DICK BUETHE, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR HLMS



I was fortunate to be invited on the first annual Messiah Lutheran Lincoln, NE trip to Haiti. The trip included members of Messiah plus a physician's assistant and a policeman from North Carolina. We brought with us 14 checked bags and 13 carry-on bags, plus money for food to be purchased in Haiti for school children. We were met at the airport by two buses, one driven by Leonard and the other by Pastor Thomas. After unloading bags and checking into our hotel, we were tired and ready for a nice meal together at the hotel.

During the next few days we made a trip to the lookout which provides a panoramic view of Port au Prince, a special treat for first time visitors. We then drove up to the Baptist Mission to do some sight seeing and have lunch. We spent almost every evening we were in Haiti attending prayer services, Bible studies and church services.

On Friday our group gave away over 50 dresses, shoes, health kits, socks, underwear and other clothing items. The Haitian people are so very happy and excited to receive these new items of clothing. We were blessed to have enough medical personnel in the group that we were able to hold a medical clinic, our team partnering with our salaried Haitian doctor and nurse treating many patients over a three day span.

We spent Sunday afternoon at Josie's orphanage where we donated 24 55-pound bags of rice for her children, as well as a suitcase full of socks and underwear. Another 13 bags of rice were

purchased for an orphanage we support in Les Cayes.

Our Messiah team enjoyed the trip, meeting our brothers and sisters in Haiti and many look forward to returning to Haiti next year! Thank you for your prayers for our team and for supporting us with material and monetary donations to support this trip; we couldn't do it without you! Your support for us is truly a blessing.
